Dear families,

It's hard to believe that we've made it to Week 4 already. Luckily this is an 11-week term, so we still have plenty of time for learning and to squeeze in as many of the special activities that mark the end of the school year as we can, given the current circumstances. The last day of the year for students is Thursday 16 December.

COVID-19

Thank you to our whole school community for helping to keep students safe given the rising COVID-19 case numbers in our region. In order to keep our school operational it is essential that we:

- Monitor exposure sites and follow NSW Health directions for testing and isolation
- Stay at home/ keep children at home if unwell
- Get tested immediately if you have even the mildest of COVID-19 symptoms and isolate until you/they get a negative result
- Don't enter the school grounds unless it is absolutely necessary call from the gate and we'll come to meet you

In the event that our school needs to close for deep cleaning and contact tracing, notifications will be posted via SkoolLoop and Facebook. Letters will be emailed to all families explaining individualised testing and isolation procedures based on level of exposure. To assist us in disseminating this information as quickly as possible, please check that you are receiving school emails and update email contact details via the school office if necessary as a matter of urgency.

At the start of the term we were hopeful that some of the restrictions on school operations might have eased by later in the year, allowing us to go ahead with traditional end-of-year special events. That now seems unlikely and preparations will be made to hold Year 6 Graduation and Presentation Day

under Level 3 COVID-safe schools protocols. This will mean that events must be held on the school grounds and visitors will be unable to attend. Our Presentation Day ceremony will be live-streamed via a Zoom link and recorded for families. We will do everything we can to make these milestone events enjoyable, memorable and safe for all.

Learning Highlights

The introduction of intensive literacy and numeracy small-group instruction in both classrooms is resulting in some terrific learning engagement and achievement. Mr Morphett is working with Stage 3 students three days each week and I am teaching groups of K-2 students. Here are some photos of

this learning in action.









Positive Behaviour for Learning

Everyone in our school community has a role to play in ensuring that school is a happy place for all students. Our vision is for each student to be eager to come to school each day, safe in the knowledge that they will be valued and cared for by their teachers and peers. We are focusing on our shared value of kindness for most of this term.

Our focus expected behaviour for Weeks 5 & 6 is:

kind words, kind actions.

Teachers will be awarding tickets to students displaying kindness and will be encouraging students to notice kindness in others. (See the lolly-guessing information later in the newsletter.) Explicit lessons will focus on the power of kindness and what kind words and actions look, sound and feel like.

This term we will be making short videos highlighting our target behaviour expectations. Students in Years 3-6 will each have a turn at being in our Values Video V (five) team. Production of our first video: Kindness in Action at

Logo

Following endorsement by the P&C, I am pleased to present our Positive Behaviour for Learning logo, featuring our values, wheat and Billabong Creek. By bringing together input from students, families and staff we have jointly developed a logo that is truly representative of our community. Thank you to everyone who contributed to this excellent outcome.

Tackling Unkindness Together

The opposite of kindness... relational aggression. As parents, it can be difficult to know what to say or do when our child reports being excluded, manipulated or the target of unkindness – especially when, at other times, the child involved might be a playmate or friend. Just as 'kindness is



catching', relational aggression is also often learned behaviour. Children learn to be unkind when they are on the receiving end of this behaviour, or when they observe it going on around them. That is why I am concerned when I hear any reports of unkindness amongst our students and why our school is committed to fostering a 'culture of kindness'. We can also support our children by fostering resilience and self-advocacy skills: the confidence to identify when they are not being treated well and to take action. The staff and I are working hard to teach students pro-social skills and to address behaviour that is not consistent with our values and behaviour expectations. As with all skill development and school cultural change, this will take time and strong home-school relationships. I have included a short reading on relational aggression in this newsletter. Please don't hesitate to reach out and have a conversation with me, or your child's teacher, if you have any concerns in this regard.

Peer Support

I was incredibly impressed at the excellent leadership and communication skills of our Peer Support Leaders in their first session yesterday. Senior students modelled respect, kindness and best effort to bring their groups together in getting-to-know-you and team-building activities. Groups made a 'jigsaw promise', played tunnel ball and did crazy animal walks. (In case you're wondering when you look at the photos: Tyler was a fish!) We will use our peer support sessions to build strong positive relationships while we explore and reinforce our shared values and expected behaviours over the rest of the term. K-2 News

This term in Maths students in K-2 have been learning about Area, Chance and data and Position. Students have been measuring the area of items in the classroom using informal units. We also compared the size of our feet and hands by tracing our feet and hands and using counters to cover the area. In PDHPE we are learning how to keep ourselves safe. This week we learnt about safe and unsafe situations.





3 - 6 News

This term during our Mappen lessons we have been learning about the difference between needs and wants, the types of resources that we have, how we use them and the nature and meaning of work. Later this term, students will be engaged in economics and business as they work in groups to develop a business plan. Students have also learnt the importance of working in groups to achieve a common goal and the attributes that lead to a successful team.

 or follow the country/region prompts.
- Once you reach your school, select it with the tick on the righthand side.
- Tap the 'select schools' button in the top right corner.
- Tap the big orange choose button. This will load your school and bring you to the settings page.
- Subscribe to the groups that are relevant to you, then click the 'go back' button on your phone, which will bring you to the main screen of your schools app.
